Urgent Appeal for Future Generation Primary School



Sudan Sunrise is partnering with Project Director, The Rev. Paul Nak, to get urgent relief to the Future Generation Primary School in Rumbek, South Sudan. Students, teachers and staff are at high risk in this time of famine in the gap period when food has run out and September harvests are a long way off.

The same day I met with Pastor Paul he had gotten news that his nephew had died of malaria and starvation.

\$1,350 for one month is needed to keep the 550 students and teachers fed. This is a higher figure than the Manute Bol Primary School, because the Future Generations School does not qualify for food donations.

Please help us get out the word, so that Future Generations can offer their students a free nutritious lunch, and help rescue their students in this time of famine. More information can be found here

Kush State University: Setbacks and Determination



When needs are so great and famine is complicated by corruption some donors simply stop giving. Individuals become multitudes of nameless faces that become easy to ignore. Take a moment to consider the Manute Bol School in Turalei, South Sudan.

1. When Victor Anyar and Sinjen Bol, Lost Boys, had their visas to the US revoked following the 911 attacks on the US, they decided not to focus on their loss, but on what they had to give.

They left their refugee camp in Kenya and returned home town to start a school. They collected a few dollars in Turalei, and began the school with one blackboard, positioned under the shade of a tree.

2. The Manute Bol Primary School students were number one in the county and number two in the state in testing this year.

3. When ethnic fighting broke out three years ago the school opened classrooms as emergency shelter for widows and orphans from the rival tribe, and then the school continued to welcome some 150 Nuer students, something extraordinary, especially in a time of conflict. Sadly, as the conflict has continued, the Nuer refugees have now fled elsewhere.

4. With the current crisis and famine, poachers have come from other areas to kill Turalei's hippos and crocodiles. The youth of Turalei, responded quickly to defend the wildlife and drive off the poachers.

5. USAID built a basketball court next to the Manute Bol Primary School some years ago, and last month, the Manute Bol team beat Gogrial, 64-47.

The students, teachers and staff are not nameless faces, but extraordinary, resilient people, who are doing a remarkable job during the challenging crisis they face. Our support makes it possible for the school to continue to function, and to provide a free and filling nutritious school lunch. Thanks to your ongoing support, last month we were able to wire over \$2,500 to the Manute Bol Primary School, which currently has 1,150 students.

Sudan Sunrise is actively seeking partners, funders and fundraisers for the strategic initiative, Kush State University in Kauda, Sudan. "We all want this to succeed," one US official stated, "but we are unable to help." Last week's mail brought a rejection letter from a foundation that we were hoping would approve a grant. Last month a much-needed \$5,000 grant from Sudan Sunrise's General Fund helped KSU keep its doors open.

KSU, is a cooperative, fledgling effort of Muslims and Christians, working together to provide university-level education for the marginalized in the Nuba Mountains of Sudan. Currently there are 120 students and some 1,500 applicants.

Akila Shokai, US Representative for Kush State University and Tom Prichard recently met last month with Dr. Jason Scorza, Vice Provost for International Affairs at Fairleigh Dickenson University, and Mary Kay Stratis, Board Member Emeritus. Dr. Scorza will be reaching out to contacts involved with other fledgling African universities to seek open source curricula for KSU.
